

The Great Vape Debate

In recent studies more and more light has been shined on the before unknown effects and dangers of the e-cigarette. In an article from WebMD, author Regina Wheeler elaborates on the harm that can come from using e-cigarettes. She talks about nicotine in and of itself being very dangerous because it can affect the memory and development of the teenage brain. Nicotine is not the only chemical used in vapes, however. Wheeler brings up the chemical formaldehyde, which is in vapes but also used to entomb the dead. She then cites the assistant VP for the national advocacy at the American Lung Association, Erika Sward, who mentions yet another cancer-causing chemical in vapes called Diacetyl. This chemical is primarily found in flavored vapes and causes a lung disease called "popcorn lung.

Almost scarier than lung disease is a newfound side effect that effectively shuts down a cells' mitochondria so the cells can't heal and the vapist is left with wounds that won't ever fully heal. Sometimes they're open sores in the mouth and other times they're stuck in the lungs. Accompanying the unhealing sores is smoker's, or vaper's, cough. Science News for Students talks about a study they conducted in an urban high school, "About 500 students said they had vaped at some point. And about 200 had vaped within the past 30 days. Those recent vapers were about twice as likely to have chronic bronchitis as were kids who had never vaped...Students who had students in the hall should have

vaped in the past, but not in the last month, also were about as likely as current vapers to have bronchitis." Even though vapes might seem safer than cigarettes, they have just as many risks as smoking. In addition to the few mentioned here, there are thousands of other chemicals in vapes that lead to bigger side effects and diseases, not to mention that the juice bought to fill vapes could've been tampered with, which could cause effects.

A major discussion regarding vaping at Olmsted Falls High School has been the closing of bathrooms in the Language Arts hallway. To get more information on the administration's stance regarding the bathrooms and vaping in our school, we interviewed Dr. Schafer. First, we asked her when they plan on re-opening the bathrooms in the Tanguage Arts wing in the Language Arts wing. She answered that for this month they will remain closed. Every month at the building leadership meeting they discuss the bathroom situation, and they haven't decided when to open them again. We followed up by asking how students signing out with their assignment notebooks will help to improve the vaping situation. She said it helps pinpoint if students are using the restroom multiple times a day every single day. It displays the pattern of behavior each student is showing, and it also helps monitor how many students are using the restroom at any given time. It serves as a universal hall pass, so all

an assignment notebook. Dr. Schafer emphasized that when it comes down to it, we have to start somewhere, and closing the bathrooms in the Language Arts wing is a good start. Those particular bathrooms were the ones they received most complaints about, possibly because they have doors, whereas the other restrooms do not. The only people monitoring those bathrooms are people in that hallway, but the whole school can monitor the other bathrooms. Each location has its faults, but that one was a starting point. We finished our interview by asking Dr. Schafer if she believes the school administration can fix this problem. She replied by saying that is a multi-layered problem and in order to fix it, everyone has to do their part.

Dr. Schafer wants students to know that they have to be passionate about the fact that we as a school will no longer be tolerant of vaping, and if they see this behavior happening, they need to let someone know. Students need to know not to start vaping because of the problems associated with it, and parents need to be aware of the signs of a vaping addiction. When asked about her last remarks, Dr. Schafer encourages students to tell the administration or a teacher if they've seen things going on. Everything has been anonymous and will continue to be in the future. Vaping is highly dangerous and addictive, and it's a problem that we as a school can work together to shut down.
