For my article, I decided to go to Target and buy some vegetarian frozen meals. I bought two meals from the brand Tattooed Chef including the Plant Based Burrito Bowl and the Enchilada Bowl. Both meals were priced at \$4.29.

Plant Based Burrito Bowl

This consisted of cilantro rice mixed with cauliflower, plant-based beef, roasted corn, and black beans in a jalapeno crema. This meal is vegan and gluten free, and it consists of 15 grams of protein. The plant-based beef is made of pea protein.

This bowl was pretty good and the pea plant beef was really good. I thought if anything, this bowl

lacked some flavor. Although a jalapeno crema was mixed throughout, if you are looking for something spicy, this is not the meal for you. I did enjoy the rice and cauliflower mixture. Overall, the bowl was a really good size and the pea plant beef was really good!

Enchilada Bowl

The enchilada bowl consisted of a corn tortilla layered in between riced cauliflower, black beans, and veggies, topped with enchilada sauce and cheddar cheese. This meal is vegetarian and gluten free, and it consists of 1 cup of veggies and 15 grams of protein.

This frozen meal was definitely a favorite. It consisted of a lot of veggies, and the enchilada sauce was really good but it didn't have much spice to it. The riced cauliflower was definitely a favorite and everything was the right consistency and went really well together. Unlike other frozen meals, after cooking, the corn tortilla was not soggy or chewy; it was perfect. I also added some of my own additional cheese on top to make it even better! Overall, this bowl was really good and I would definitely purchase it again.
