Our district extends a warm welcome to Mr. Perez and looks forward to his contributions to advancing the district's mission of inspiring and empowering students.




TREASURER'S UPDATE: YEAR-END CASH BALANCE TRACKING

Olmsted Falls City Schools prides itself on being fiscally responsible stewards of our taxpayer dollars. Continuous monitoring and attention to detail ensures district operations are running at a high level of efficiency and that budget projections remain on track. The treasurer's office provides the Board of Education with monthly financial reports reflecting our current cash position, the actual performance compared to our plan, and an estimation of the impacts of the remaining periods to our projected ending cash balance.

Olmsted Falls City Schools is in a solid financial position heading into the second half of this fiscal year. As of Jan. 31, 2024, our financial review shows that our revenues are tracking \$200,133 above projections, thanks to diligent fiscal management and effective planning. While our expenses currently exceed our initial forecasts by \$91,571, it's important to understand that there are still five months remaining in our budget cycle and that this variance is relatively minor when viewed against the backdrop of our comprehensive \$50.1 million budget.

Despite these higher expenses as of January 31, we project a year-end cash balance increase of \$108,562. These figures provide a snapshot of our current financial status, but this is positive news for our financial outlook and is reflective of our district's dedication to careful planning and spending.

Since its inception last fall, the Committee has convened three times, with each session proving instrumental in building a foundation of knowledge that will help shape the creation of the district's next Master Facilities Plan. Key achievements to date include:

Mastering the Planning Process:

Committee members have gained a comprehensive understanding of the master facilities planning process, a vital step in ensuring the district's infrastructure aligns with its educational objectives.

Assessing Current Infrastructure:

Through thorough reviews and site visits, the Committee has delved into the history and status of Olmsted Falls' existing school buildings and transportation facilities, taking stock of their strengths and areas for improvement.

Exploring Modern Learning Spaces:

Recognizing the evolving needs of education, the Committee has explored educational visioning and modern learning spaces, ensuring that the district remains at the forefront of innovation.

Addressing Maintenance Challenges:

Understanding the impact of deferred maintenance on budgeting and operational efficiency, the Committee has proactively explored the concept in order to understand its impact on future facilities decisions.

MEET SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER RYAN HARE!

Officer Ryan Hare is the newest addition to the school district's team of School Resource Officers! Hailing from the Olmsted Township Police Department (OTPD), Officer Hare officially began his tenure at Olmsted Falls High School back in November, replacing long-time School Resource Officer (SRO) Joe English, who was promoted to Olmsted Township Police Department Sergeant. Before he was appointed full-time SRO for Olmsted Falls City Schools, Officer Hare served as a certified Drone Operator and E-Bike Operator for the police department. He was recognized by local media this past fall for his role in using his expert drone skills to help locate a missing Olmsted Township resident.

Officer Hare joins fellow OTPD Officer Gary Dieckman and Olmsted Falls Police Department Officer Bob Swope in keeping our school hallways and classrooms safe. Officer Hare has already made quite a mark in helping to keep our schools a safe place, and Superintendent Dr. Jim Lloyd is thrilled to have him on board.

Being a School Resource Officer is about more than just patrols and security checks. Beyond their law enforcement duties, SROs actively engage in educational initiatives, delivering programs on personal safety, internet safety, and substance abuse awareness. These initiatives are part of a collaborative effort involving the Board of Education, local elected officials, and police departments, with funding support from the Governor's budget for Student Health and Wellness.

So next time you see Officer Ryan roaming the halls, give him a high five and a warm Bulldog welcome. Together, we're making sure our schools are safe and a place where everyone can thrive.




UPDATE ON BENEFITS-BASED ACCOUNTABILITY

Each school within our district has identified certain benefits within the seven pillars as priority benefits.

BUILDINGS IDENTIFY PRIORITY BENEFITS

As Olmsted Falls City Schools continues the roll-out of its new Benefits-Based Accountability (BBA) system, we're excited to share a summary of the benefits each building has prioritized. Our BBA system requires our schools to engage their primary stakeholders to identify benefits that are most important to them and to develop a system to provide more of those benefits they've identified. Moreover, it requires each school to develop an evidence-gathering system so that the school can report the progress it has made on those benefits identified in a language that our stakeholders can understand.



HUMBLE CONVERSATIONS WITH DR. KNIGHT

In partnership with the LINK Family Engagement Program, Olmsted Falls City Schools recently wrapped up a three-part workshop series for Bulldog parents and caregivers. Led by Dr. James Knight, author of "With Heart," these sessions shared practical ways to help children learn to look past the differences of those around them and practice kindness, humility, and curiosity.

Olmsted Falls Schools believes in creating a safe and welcoming environment where everyone treats each other with respect and kindness. These workshops aimed to help parents talk to their children—and teach them how to talk to others—about differences.

In today's world, there are many cultural differences and disagreements. Dr. Knight's workshops promote cultural humility and encourage open conversations. Participants were encouraged to think about their own biases and learn to better understand others.

The workshops explored questions like how to be respectful in different situations, how to recognize our own biases, and how to teach kids to be curious about other cultures. Participants also learned ways to encourage empathy and kindness in their children, preparing our students to be the leaders and changemakers of tomorrow.

The first workshop, held on Jan. 31, gave parents a chance to talk and share ideas in a relaxed setting while Dr. Knight facilitated meaningful conversations, encouraging attendees to reflect on their own experiences and perspectives. Parents not only got practical tips from the workshops but also received a free copy of Dr. Knight's book, "Heart: A Journey Toward Cultural Humility," thanks to Superintendent Dr. Jim Lloyd.

Each building collaboratively determined their benefits based on feedback from students, parents and caregivers. The benefits selected by buildings reflect those areas that are most important to these primary stakeholders, and they are the ones that school administrators and staff believe can be further enhanced to maximize positive outcomes for students. Each building is currently working on compiling evidence to report out to families actionable items that help support and enrich the benefits their respective parents, caregivers and students want to see.


It is important to note that those benefits not currently identified as "priority" by a school (or schools) are still important and actually represent benefit areas the school is already providing successfully. Moving forward, over time, the collection of

benefits each school chooses to focus on as priority can change and evolve based on continuing input from stakeholders and the level of impact of current programming.

We believe the BBA system uses a broader lens to capture and report on what and how schools are doing, and as a result, it will provide a more comprehensive report when compared to the more traditional (and antiquated) test-based score system that our State government has had in place for decades. BBA is different and better in both process and form, and more fully represents the "Triple A" experience students are receiving in Olmsted Falls Schools.







The workshops emphasized the importance of starting conversations on kindness and respect at the grassroots level. By empowering parents and caregivers to raise empathetic and culturally aware children, the workshops aimed to make a positive impact on the community.

As we work toward a more inclusive and kind world, initiatives like this workshop series serve as vital stepping stones toward building a brighter future. Through open dialogue, introspection, and a commitment to fostering empathy, we can create a world where everyone feels respected and valued.




